

SISU (Spring 2018)

Literary and cultural theory: intensive introduction (Prof. Steppat)

This intensive course offers a comprehensive introduction to major directions in literary and cultural theory, as they have developed in recent decades. In many cases, these two dimensions of theory cover similar ground and have some impact on each other. At least some of the theories will be illustrated with a variety of literary texts from various genres (poetry, short story and novel, drama). Students will be asked to do preparatory reading before the course begins, ESPECIALLY the materials until the 8th course hour. Wherever possible, students will collect their own questions on the materials. They should circulate these questions to members by making use of the SISU e-learning online platform. The actual course sessions will then include an important *focus on students' own questions*. A part of the course sessions will be devoted to examining theoretical approaches for their potential application regarding literary works, and possible modifications of approaches. The course is strongly recommended for any M.A. students interested in transferring to the University of Bayreuth for the international dual degree program. But the course is designed to be equally useful for other M.A. students from various programs. If there is any difficulty gaining access to the text materials, some of which will be placed on the e-learning platform, students should contact Prof. Steppat (Michael.Steppat@uni-bayreuth.de). For 2 credits: essay requirement.

Syllabus

Course hours 1-5: Introduction // Peter Barry, *Beginning Theory*: Structuralism, poststructuralism, followed by literary illustration (Dylan Thomas, Poem)

Course hours 6-8: (cont. Barry) Psychoanalytic theory, followed by literary illustration (Edgar Allan Poe, a short story), feminist theory

Course hours 9-12: (cont. Barry) Marxist criticism, (possible extension: new historicism with cultural materialism), narratology, followed by literary illustration (Edgar Allan Poe, a short story), ecocriticism / *Special handout*: Posthumanism

Course hour 13: Literary analysis, to exemplify: Ee Tiang Hong, Poem

Course hours 14-17: Stuart Hall, *Questions of Cultural Identity*: some core aspects

Course hours 18-22: Literary analysis, to exemplify: Walt Whitman, *Leaves of Grass* (section); Joseph Conrad, *Heart of Darkness*

Course hours 23-27: continue the above for critical questions and topic extensions

Course hours 28-32: Literary analysis, to exemplify: William Shakespeare, *Othello*

NB. We may modify the precise hour arrangements during the course period, depending on actual progress
